FEBRUARY

Worship, a continued conversation.

I have just spent a few weeks in classes in the Doctoral Program at Colgate Rochester Crozer Divinity School. They were two weeks of reading, thinking, praying, discussing and growing with ministers from all over the United States and from different Christian denominations. The program that I am in is *Transformational Leadership with a Concentration in Prophetic Preaching and a Focus on the Arts*. The courses are stimulating and inspiring and I am convinced more and more of my calling in ministry.

I am a musician and an artist. Before becoming an ordained minister in the Presbyterian Church USA, I served as Director of Music Ministries and Worship Coordinator in the Christian Reformed Church. In the Reformed Tradition, the arts had not found a prominent place in worship, at least not in many churches in the US and Canada. God used a group of artists to plant a seed in my heart to undertake a lifetime of growing in understanding and experience that has changed the way I do ministry. In a meeting with a group of Christian artists I was introduced to both the vacuum and the rich opportunity surrounding the arts. That experience has sent me searching. Since that time I have been blessed to serve in churches open to artistic expression, learning as we go how best to do so. I have seen the way people of all ages have participated, enjoyed the arts in and around worship, and as a result they have found ownership in the church and a deeper understanding of God. The arts and worship have become a passion of mine since that time.

I believe that in a culture rich in visual stimulation and saturated in media and technology, visual art, music, language, dance and drama are some of God's gifts that have the capacity to bring freshness to faith and worship, and the possibility of providing a bridge for those in our society who have turned away from the church or are struggling with its relevance. The arts have the power to engage the mind, soul and body and bring a sense of community as people work together to understand God and worship in imaginative and creative ways.

I continue to explore new expressions in worship, not as gimmicks for bringing people into church, but as authentic acts of worship. I am inviting all artists in this church to consider the gifts God has given you and dream dreams about how arts can be used to better enhance God's dialogue with us on Sunday mornings and during other times. In a few weeks I will invite you to meet with me and we can begin a conversation here at Webster Presbyterian Church about these very things. Let us be people of prayer and ask God's guidance and blessing as we approach God's holy presence in ways that are well pleasing to God and bring honor and praise. In worship the church is transformed and renewed, equipped and sent to serve God's reign in the world. That is our prayer and our hearts' desire. May we find ways to use the arts to those ends.

SESSION NOTES



At the January session meeting we examined and confirmed new church officers. Incoming Elders include Bill Barr, Mary Ellen Collinge, Paul Crumley, Jim Hoffman, and Beth Petrino.

New Trustee Bruce Wainwright will join Peter Carr, Don George, Christine Schaller, and Jaol Jamison who are all re-enlisting for additional terms. Session expressed pleasure in the willingness of these officers to serve WPC in the coming years. Many thanks go to Carol Walck and Joyce Tompkins and their committee for finding such a fine slate of candidates.

Session also approved the 2012 budget. Budgeting was especially complex this year. There was an overage in monies from the 2011 budget resulting from the unfilled position of Associate Pastor. Excess funds from 2011 will be used to fund capital improvements and Mission obligations in 2012. As a result of decreased pledging, no raises will be offered to staff in 2012. Elder Bob Rich and his committee worked hard to present a balanced budget for 2012.

Session held a robust discussion on reconfiguration of the Sunday morning schedule. At issue is the need for a convenient time slot for Child and Adult Education, as well as the need for a reduction in the number of worship services since our church cannot continue to support the current three service model. Three listening meetings were scheduled (one on January 15 and two on January 22) to allow the congregation to express their ideas on the best way to arrange the Sunday worship and education schedules.

Session also approved the terms of call for Rev. Eileen Borduin Vanderzwan and welcomed her to her first WPC Session meeting.

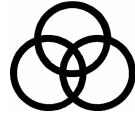

FROM OUR PRINT LIBRARY...



Are you a fan of coffee shops such as Starbucks? Do you like the warmth and richness of the experience? Starbucks has grown to be a huge phenomenon around the world. In his book, *The Gospel According to Starbucks: Living with a Grand Passion*, Leonard Sweet examines how Starbucks has continued to draw people in while churches are losing members. Is there something we could learn from Starbucks? The CEO of Starbucks calls himself an “evangelist of coffee.” His philosophy is “life is meant to be lived with passion, and that passion is found and practiced through experiences, connections, symbols and images, and the full participation of every part of your being.” When you enter Starbucks you do not stand and observe; you fully participate. It is a full sensory experience. Sweet believes this is what has led to the growth of Starbucks and is the blind spot or weaknesses of the church. Churches are looking for new ways to bring in people. Sweet suggests churches need to go beyond Theology and ritual and follow Starbucks EPIC philosophy. They took a hot common beverage and made it an EPIC drink people cannot live without. EPIC stands for Experience, Participation, Images that throb with meaning, and Connection. Starbucks provides passion and relationships that are a meaningful experience. Is this also what we look for in our churches?

This is a thought-provoking book about churches in this technological world. He talks about how to bring the participation and passion back to religion. Leonard Sweet is a professor of Evangelism at Drew Theological School in New Jersey and president of SpritVenture Ministries.

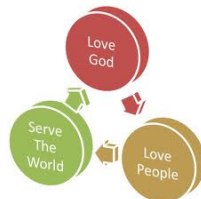
Learning for a Lifetime


Mission: West Virginia Work Team Report – Members of WPC don't just *talk* of missions being important, they also *do* something about missions. In addition to a large portion of annual income of the church being devoted to that cause, members *go* to places where funds are sent, usually helping the recipients of the largess of WPC members.



WPC Adult Work Teams who have gone to the Gulf States and Iowa have reported to the congregation in past years, and a group of 13 who went to Gilbert, West Virginia will tell of their October 2011 trip at the February 5 Mission Adult Ed. presentation at 9:00 a.m. in the Chapel. That area of WV is remote, and the WPC Work Team addressed problems of poverty and flood relief while maintaining a good report with the inhabitants of the buildings that they worked on. There were many friendships formed in the process.

Come and hear real, live WPC mission workers tell of their experiences – some hilarious, some inspiring – while putting their “shoulders to the wheel” to provide a few families more decent housing.



Sandwich School: *Islam and Christianity* – Sandwich School resumes on February 5 with an offering titled *Islam and Christianity*. 



Islam is having a significant impact on the world today, but there is a lot of confusion about what it stands for. In this course we will learn about the key beliefs and practices of Islam. We will also compare them with those of the Christian faith to help us deepen our understanding of our beliefs and to see our practices in a new light.

This six-week course will be taught by Bob Rice and Connie Rice. The participant book will be available for a \$5 donation at the class. A light lunch will be served; our thanks to Scott and Stephanie Oelkers for organizing the food.

Future Shock – Tony Hubbard will be leading a discussion which will look back at the 1970s book and film entitled *Future Shock* by Alvin and Heidi Toffler. We'll be considering how our faith can help us in the future. - The Chapel Narthex ceiling and the ceiling over Room 9/10 have been re-insulated to improve energy efficiency and reduce ceiling leaks.
- Plans are underway to paint the Chapel. Volunteers will be sought for this project.

PRESBYTERY NOTES

AS PROMISED

Because so much happened at the November Presbytery Meeting, I covered some last month and more now. Genesee Valley Presbytery met at the end of January, but after *The Pathway* deadline. Stay tuned for my March column.

Through its Mission & Advocacy Committee, GVP participates in the **Iraq Partnership Network**, the latest version of protestant activity which began with European and American Christians living in Mesopotamia in 1830. Continuing the work of the 20th century United Mission in Iraq, a cooperation between reformed churches working toward God's just peace there, IPN is one of more than 38 mission networks that connect Presbyterians who share a common mission interest. IPN expressed concern for the Iraqis who worked with the US during the war and believe that the US has a moral responsibility to provide safe haven for those who risked their lives to support our efforts. Presbytery commissioners who share this concern were asked to contact the president and their senators or congresspersons and to pray for this situation.

The **Presbytery Foundation** will no longer be a separate entity but its work will continue. The function of the Foundation Board is being transferred to the Presbytery Trustees, its education work to the Stewardship & Interpretation Committee, and its granting function to the Mission & Advocacy Committee.

Report from the most recent meeting of the **Synod of the Northeast** noted that overtures from the Presbyteries of Albany and Geneva regarding the future form and function of the Synod were referred to the Transition Team. (Presbytery voted to concur with the Albany Overture which recommends work toward the elimination of the Synod level governing Council.)

Synod's ministries and missions normally originate and are conducted in their geographic areas through **Synod Partnership Groups**. The presbyteries of Genesee Valley, Geneva and Western New York make up one of these. PPG Block Grants have been approved for GVP projects: \$5000 to our Rural and Migrant Ministry, \$7500 each for 2011 and 2012 to the New Church Development (the Seekers), \$7500 for Lagom Landing, and \$4000 to be designated by the Presbytery (GVP will use \$1500 for the 50th anniversary All-Presbytery Worship Celebration in 2013).

GVP's **Church Leadership Development Day** begins at 8:30 a.m. on Saturday, Feb. 11, at Perinton PC. There will be 6 morning courses and 5 working lunch courses helpful to elders, deacons, clerks of Session, treasurers, trustees, pastors, and Mission Committees. Fee is \$5 per person with registration due Feb. 6.
