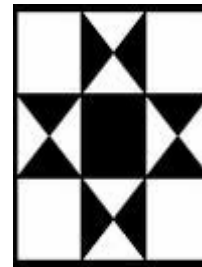


## SPRING FEVER QUILT WALK

Dear Friends in Christ,

In a recent issue of *The Christian Century*, theologian and author Brian McLaren offers readers an article entitled simply, "Is God Violent?" I bring this up because of all the issues that we have wrestled with these past several years as we have read through the Bible and read through our newspapers, this is the most pressing and, I might add, the most difficult and perplexing. More of you have wanted to talk about this issue more than any other theological issue.



Let's start with a definition of what violence is. According to Webster's dictionary, violence is defined as "force with the intent of inflicting injury, damage, or death." McLaren suggests that based on this definition there are four primary responses to the question of God's violence, defined this way (page 18 from the article):

1. **God is Violent**, and since we human beings are made in God's image, we are free to use violence as one valid form of political communication.
2. **God is Violent**, but in a holy way that human beings are incapable of. Violence is generally prohibited for humans except in certain limited cases, and only those designated as God's chosen/elect/ordained, acting under God's explicit direction, are justified in using violence.
3. **God is Not Violent**, so human violence is always a violation of our creation in God's image – both for the perpetrator and the victim. If it is ever employed, it is always tragic and regrettable and never justified.
4. **God is Not Violent**, so violence in any form is absolutely forbidden, no exceptions.

It's interesting to note that since the Bible is chocked full of violence, most Christians come down concluding that offering one or two is the right response. Apparently, many theologians of every age have also started with this premise including Augustine, Aquinas, Luther, Calvin, Scofield and, most often, the papacy through the centuries of the Catholic Church. We have volumes written on this subject starting with the premise that "God is violent," so how are we mere mortals going to respond?



What if instead of reading what has been written through the years about this subject, we first turned to Jesus, his life and his words. As McLaren says, "If Jesus truly was the highest and fullest revelation of God, if Jesus was truly the *logos*, the radiance of God's glory, the exact representation of God's nature, then his life and teaching mattered in tensions like this. And if the Bible was intended, as Jesus said, to bear witness to Christ, or as Martin Luther said, to be the manger on which Christ was presented to the world, then "when in doubt, consult Jesus" seems like good advice.

I think that I am on very solid ground when I say that Jesus never killed anyone, unlike many other Biblical stars. In fact, I believe that Jesus presented to us all the image of a "non-violent God" (number four on McLaren's list) and so, "violence in any form is absolutely forbidden!" On the other hand, the Bible and the history of God's people is littered with violence, and often we have been quick to believe that some violence is justified (see number two) because we are "acting under God's explicit direction." Think about how many different groups have claimed that authority through the years!

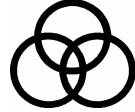

### NEW - MAYBE and NEW – YES

Ever since I became the Journal Clerk for the Presbytery of Genesee Valley I have undertaken, at my own volition, to keep the congregation better informed as to what was going on in the higher judicatories.

I love that word and it used to be the collective name for presbyteries, synods, and General Assembly. The name then became Middle Governing Bodies and soon will be Councils if the New Form of Government is passed – nFOG is now being voted upon by the presbyteries and will be voted upon at the GVP meeting Mar. 26 at 1<sup>st</sup> PC Brockport. Commissioners and interested persons may learn more at a special meeting on Tues., Mar. 22 from 7 to 8:30 p.m. at 12 Corners PC. I will soon be assisted in my endeavors by a new committee of Session, the Governing Body Relations Committee, which has the general responsibility for relations between Session and committees and boards within WPC, and with higher denominational governing bodies. The 7-member committee will include the committee chair (a member of Session), Clerk of Session (I have just graduated from Session and Stephanie Lux is taking my place as clerk), commissioner to Presbytery, 1 Elder from a paired committee, 1 Trustee, 1 Deacon, 1 Youth, (1 at-large member-optional). In brief, specific responsibilities will be: education of Session; review/report to Session on the work and effectiveness of Deacons, Trustees, Session committees and task forces; maintain/update Session by-laws, committee job descriptions, policy manuals; assist in determining appropriate use of church property; propose such measures as may be of common concern to the mission of the whole church; facilitate implementation of principles of participation and inclusiveness; facilitate instruction, examination, ordination, installation, welcoming into common ministry elders and deacons and inquire into their faithfulness in fulfilling responsibilities.

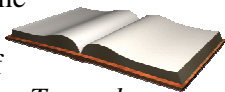
## PEACEMAKING

*"Justice is what love looks like in public."

March 9 begins the Christian season of Lent, the 40 days before Easter that remind us of the 40 days that Christ fasted in the wilderness; the 40 days of Temptation. How easy it is to be tempted, especially in March. We are so tired of the winter. We are tired of the political rhetoric. We are tired of working for peace when it seems so elusive. We are tired of trying without seeing results. It is just when we are so tired and so able to be tempted that we need to pay attention to the example of Christ. Even after 40 days of fasting, he was able to turn away from the temptations to eat, show power or take credit. Instead of saying, "Just this once, I'll do what I want," Christ took the path of humility and did not give in to the temptation.

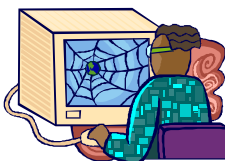
In keeping with our theme of Meeting at the Margins, The Peacemaking Committee is suggesting that we all take some time out during this Lenten season to take a path of humility and read *Welcoming Justice: God's Movement Toward Beloved Community* by Charles Marsh and John M. Perkins. These two men have modeled the Beloved Community of God, meeting people at the margins and showing God's love. We won't all follow their exact path, but what we all can do is read about their example and consider how we can, in the life we live, participate in the Beloved Community.



There are six chapters – one for each week in Lent. Each chapter is short and can be read easily in one sitting. At the end of each chapter there are questions to think about. This can be a good discipline to help us all apply the thoughts to our own life – removing the temptation to say, "Easy enough for you given the life you have chosen, but that doesn't apply to me."
