Clerk's Corner --

Does 1825 ring a bell for anyone? The Erie Canal opened that year, and eleven people formed the Presbyterian Church of North Penfield which later became the Webster Presbyterian Church, our church. In 1975 the Church Historical Committee wrote a 49 page history of WPC for the church's sesquicentennial. Later this year Session will begin thinking about planning a bicentennial celebration for 2025. We will be interested in folks to help us document our history over the last fifty years. If you are interested in helping, please let me know. It's no surprise that much has changed in the last two hundred years:



new church buildings, many WPC pastors, social upheaval, wars, changing cultural values, technology, etc.

Here are a couple of stories from the 1975 booklet. In the 1840s a man was brought before Session to defend himself for fishing on the Sabbath. During the Civil War, Reverend Robert McMath used his house on Main Street as a station for the Underground Railroad to help enslaved persons escape from the south to Canada. They were transported in large hay wagons to Pultneyville where they were loaded onto a sailing schooner for Canada and freedom.

COLLECTION OF SUMMER CLOTHING FOR CAMERON COMMUNITY MINISTRIES

Until June 14th the Mission Committee is continuing to collect summer clothing for Cameron Community Ministries. New or gently used men's, women's or children's clothing is appreciated. If you don't have anything to donate from your closets, please consider purchasing something at a local thrift or discount store to donate. Collection boxes are located in the Narthex, upper hallway, and outside the north entrance door. Please be as generous as possible, as these clothes are distributed in one of the very poorest areas of Rochester and demand is great because of the pandemic.



SUMMER MISSION PROJECTS



This year the Mission Committee is pleased to offer two very worthy local projects for Summer Mission! One is **Bella's Bumbas**, a Webster-based project that provides small "wheelchair-like" devices to greatly increase mobility for many physically challenged young children who are located, not just in the USA, but in at least 45 other countries as well! Since their start, they have built about 2000 such chairs of various designs! Since the recipients don't pay for these chairs and many times cannot even afford the shipping cost, Bella's Bumbas has a constant, significant need for voluntary funding.

The second project is the **South Wedge Food Program**, a food cupboard which is currently located in the basement of the former Calvary St. Andrews Presbyterian Church building in the south wedge part of Rochester. Their requests for food have grown dramatically during the pandemic, and they currently deliver as many as 2000 boxes per week! Due to this increased demand, they have outgrown their current location and are searching for a larger, handicap accessible facility somewhere in the city. Our contributions will help them greatly during this time of very high expenses for food and for extra costs associated with their move.



Our goal this summer is \$6,000, and we will divide whatever is received evenly between these two organizations. Envelopes for contributions will be on the chairs at church between June 6 and late August, or you can mail your contribution to the church or contribute online beginning in June.

Also, please don't forget to attend the Zoom Adult Ed on Wednesday June 2 at 7:00 p.m. to learn more about both of these projects.

WORK MORNINGS AT GRACE HOUSE

SCHOOL SUPPLIES COLLECTION

WEBSTER PRESBYTERIAN PRESCHOOL CLOSES ITS DOORS

After 50 years of serving over 3,000 young children in the Webster community, Webster Presbyterian Pre-School made the difficult decision to permanently close our program. The school was started in 1971 by church member Kathy Grose (church member Jan Rich took over as Director in 1992 and church member Amy Crumley began running the program in 2008). Unfortunately, a global pandemic and the growth of free Universal Pre-K in the Webster School district proved too challenging to overcome.

The Pre-School's remaining assets have been donated to the church. In addition, the preschool staff has organized a sale of all items not needed by Children's Christian Education on Thursday June 3rd, Friday June 4th and Saturday June 5th. We have some specific rules in place due to Covid:

- In order to reduce crowding, to attend the sale you must sign up for a specific time slot via our Signup Genius Link: https://www.signupgenius.com/go/10C084EAEAF23A0F94-webster_ Signups for church members, preschool alumni families and the community have already begun. - We are only allowing 2 adults to attend from each family in each time slot.
- All attendees must wear a mask the entire time.
- No children will be allowed.
- We are accepting payment via cash or check only. Checks will be written to Webster Presbyterian Church.

FROM THE HEALING & RECONCILIATION TEAM

Your HRSC Team* has been working diligently to provide you with programs that we believe will enable us to heal and learn from the trauma we all experienced last year. There were two Congregation Conversations held via Zoom during Adult Ed (Learning for a Lifetime) on Wednesday evenings, moderated by our professional coach, Rev. Dr. Janice Lee Fitzgerald. Janice also conducted a four-part series on Healthy Boundaries Education during the whole month of May during the same time slot. There was a debriefing for the 2020 Session that worked through the crisis. We will be offering a grief workshop this month which will be described later in this article. We need your participation in these programs to help lead us to a place where we are ready to form a Pastor Nominating Committee. The Committee on Ministry of the Presbytery must give us their blessing before we can proceed, and we can't proceed until we have sufficiently healed. We can only know that by your participation and communication. Please join us. With God's help, we can do this so we can ensure that our church is safe and welcoming and glorifies God.

On Wednesday, June 16th at 7:00 P.M. on Zoom and tentatively in person, Adrienne Daniels, Manager of Bereavement and Grief Services of Rochester Regional Health Hospice, will be conducting a 90 minute Grief Workshop. Here is how Adrienne describes it:

SUMMER OFFICE HOURS




Beginning May 31st through Labor Day, the church office will

AN INVITATION TO SHARE YOUR THOUGHTS

Hi WPC friends - I admire your faith and strength during the past year. I am preparing for devotions for an upcoming meeting and was introduced recently to the story of Sisyphus. Please read the quick summary of Sisyphus below and then reply to me only with a word or two about what is the "Boulder" you continue to roll up the WPC "hill".

Sisyphus was a cruel Greek king who was punished by having to push a large rock up a steep hill, only to find it rolling back when nearing the top. Ever since, he has been known for pushing the rock tirelessly till eternity. Sisyphus



was unstoppable; he pushed the rock unabated every time it rolled down. He refused to surrender to gravity.

Pushing the rock was Sisyphus' purpose, and no matter how evil he was, he is still remembered for his labor towards his purpose. Without the rock, or the effort, he wouldn't be a topic of anyone's discussion.

"GREEN TIPS" FOR YOUR CONSIDERATION

Choose daytime flights to lower the impact of aviation on climate change. According to a study conducted by the University of Leeds, night flights are twice as bad for the environment as day flights, because airplanes' condensation trails (aka contrails) trap heat the same way clouds do. However, during the day they reflect sunlight back into space and help keep the planet cool.

When mail ordering, skip the two-day shipping if possible. Ground shipping uses less energy than airmail.

According to Douglas Tallamy, a professor of Entomology and Wildlife Ecology at the University of Delaware, if each American landowner made it a goal to convert half of his or her lawn to productive native plant communities, even moderate success could collectively restore some semblance of ecosystem function to more than twenty million acres of what is now ecological wasteland.

Two minutes in nature reduces stress, muscle tension and blood pressure. Two hours in nature improves memory performance and attention span by 20%. Two days in nature increases cancer fighting white blood cells by 50%. Contact with nature is shown to reduce anxiety, depression, ADD symptoms, and the risk of diabetes, while increasing energy, immunity, weight loss, fitness, and vitamin D production.

Many clothes fall apart quickly. Instead, buy clothes from socially just and environmentally friendly companies that design clothes to last, or buy clothes secondhand to keep them out of the landfill.
