
Learning for a Lifetime

Welcome back to in-person "Learning for a Lifetime" each Sunday morning following the worship service! A variety of classes will be offered ranging from Bible studies to discussion of contemporary topics, all with the purpose of helping us grow spiritually and in discipleship.

Throughout this year, we will have multiple opportunities to explore the meaning of Christian Ethics which, as spoken to us by the Word of God, teaches us how to live a life pleasing to Him. We will discuss how we are called to respond to social, justice, and environmental issues affecting our church, our community and our world.

On Sunday, September 12th, we will welcome guest speaker Dr. Elizabeth Gerhardt, Professor of Theology and Social Ethics at Northeastern Seminary in Rochester. She is a sought-after speaker and lectures across the United States. Dr. Gerhardt's research interests focus on the application of the theology of the cross to contemporary global justice issues and church response.

WPC is upgrading the equipment that is used for presenting our Sunday Worship service online. This includes a new computer system, a new camera, and new video & audio production software. To my Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Experience has taught me that many churchgoers prefer pastors who speak only of the Jesus who says, "Come unto me all you carrying heavy burdens and I will give you rest." Or the Jesus who says, "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid."

It is said that the work of pastors is to "comfort the disturbed and disturb the comfortable." If, however, pastors choose only the role of comforter, we would not be following the model Jesus set for us. Jesus modeled being both the comforter and the disturber.

Jesus challenged our relationship to "the patterns of the world;" he rejected some of the world's patterns. What first comes to my mind is Jesus in the temple saying, "Take these things away; do not make my Father's house a house of trade."

This brings to my mind a conversation I started several months ago about "socially responsible investing." A conversation that now seems far more challenging for the church than I anticipated. A conversation now waiting upon a consideration of the "core values" of the church.

There is a familiar song with the lyric, "You will know they are Christians by their love." The message of the song bases itself on the 35th verse of the 13th chapter of the Gospel of John.

I'm certain you are all aware that the North American Christian Church is shrinking. Our church is shrinking as well. It would be easy for us to say that we are part of a trend and simply do nothing. Jesus, however, asks in the Gospel of Luke, "Why do you not analyze this present time?" My analysis is partly this: We have signed onto the patterns of the world, and those patterns are not [actually have never been] compatible with the love needed at this present time. Those patterns are not the spirituality our neighbors or the world is looking for.

I've begun to ask church members, "What will we do so this church exists in perpetuity?" Can we discover within ourselves the same spiritual depth as John the Baptist and be a voice crying out in the wilderness? Can we make the all-inclusive love of God figure boldly in our public witness?

My prayer and my hope is that I can meet Jesus one day and say, "Yes, I've been a witness to your love." I pray and hope the same for each of you.

SESSION NEWS

At the June meeting Session passed a motion entitled: *Christian Environmental Ethics Renewable Energy Statement*. You can read the motion on the church Website: https://www.websterpres.org/about-us/. Session asked the Trustees to



review the Community Solar Program sponsored by the Rochester Area Interfaith Climate Action (RAICA) group to determine if this program would be an acceptable way to begin moving the church to participation in community solar. The Trustees reviewed the program and have enrolled the church in the program. As a result, WPC will be on a waiting list for a solar farm to be built sometime later in 2021 or 2022. We will continue to receive most of our electric supply from RG&E. A portion of our electric supply in the future will come from community solar. The church will receive a 10% reduction in the cost for the portion of its electric bill that comes from solar thanks to an incentive program offered by the New York State Energy Research and Development Agency resulting in what we expect to be over a \$300 annual reduction in our total electric bill.



Have you noticed the new Social Room floor?

In August, Trustees Dick Dodd, Bob Kizer, Gary Maier and John Wilbert, with the aid of a few Boy Scouts and other volunteers Brad Adams, Tony Hubbard, Herman Rolle, and Bruce Wainwright, removed the old tiles from the Social Room floor in preparation for the sanding of the floor by "Upstate Increte." The company then applied a vapor barrier before applying High Performance Epoxy with vinyl chips. This was followed with two layers of clear Polyaspartic Topcoat. Ready to go! (Thank you to the Maiers and Herman for the follow-up cleaning of the dusty kitchen!)

Earlier in the summer, after two separate bouts of torrential rain downpours, our Sanctuary was flooded twice. The Trustees extensively vacuumed the carpet to remove the water. Outside windows were sealed, ditches

were dug, and professionals were brought in to view and clear drainage pipes and gutter downspouts. The Sanctuary should now be flood-proof.

SUMMER MISSION NEWS

The church had an active summer on the mission front.

Summer Mission Projects

This year the Mission Committee offered two very worthy local projects for Summer Mission:

- Bellas Bumbas, a Webster-based project that provides small "wheelchair-like" devices to greatly increase mobility for many physically challenged young children;
- 2) Southwedge Food Program, a food cupboard which is currently located in the basement of the former Calvary St. Andrews Presbyterian Church building and which has had greatly increased demand for food since the pandemic began.

As of this writing the close-to-final total of contributions is \$ 5,287.

KENYA STUDENTS' EDUCATION FUND

The Mission Committee, with approval from Session, Stewardship and Budget, and Peace and Justice, is pleased to announce a new fund to support extremely poor students in Kenya for their high school expenses. Three Kenya students (two girls and one boy) began high school in early August with our sponsorship using this fund.

The "seed money" for this new fund was taken from the re-purposed Ngcokovane Fund which had been used since the 1980's by our Peace and Justice Committee to provide support to worthy Africans who were studying for the ministry or for some other Christian

occupation. It was named for Cecil Ngcokovane, a black South African pastor who spent several months with us in the mid-1980's, but was then murdered shortly after he returned to South Africa as part of the Apartheid struggle. However, this fund became very difficult to administer for that purpose, and for the last few years went unused.

Monies from the Ngcokovane Fund have already paid for the first year of schooling and will pay for part of their second year for the three needy students. However, paying for the rest of their second year and for their third and fourth years will depend on voluntary contributions from us. We may even be able to support more students in the future if donations are sufficient!

CHILDREN'S CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Our new church school year begins on Sunday, September 12th at

9:30. With a new school year comes a new Sunday morning program called SHINE.

The SHINE class is for children in PreK through 5th grade. It will include Bible lessons with Anita Brocker, chimes/bells with Jackie Anderson, and crafts/community service projects with Gayl Galen. Each Sunday when the children are dismissed from worship, they will attend Praise and Worship in Room 2. The room has been transformed into a children's worship space with benches and a communion table. We will begin with praise music and prayer before heading off to Room 3 for the morning class. The lesson material is centered around The Fruit of the Spirit. Each month we will focus on a different quality such as Love, Patience, Peace and Kindness. The children will learn how to grow and nurture the Fruit of the Spirit in their own lives and how to show God's love.



On September 20th and 27th, Anita Brocker will be teaching the children about communion. Parents are welcome to join us for those lessons.

Safety Guidelines

Children attending the SHINE program will need to wear a mask when we are gathered together for the morning program. All of our adult volunteers are fully vaccinated. Thanks to WPC Trustee Gary Maier, there is a new ventilation system in Room 3 where our program will be held. This system will help to circulate the air throughout the morning. The classroom door will also be left open at all times. We want your children to be safe and we want you to feel comfortable bringing them back to church. It will be wonderful having all of our WPC kids back together again!

<u>Adult Volunteers are needed</u> to help with the SHINE program as support for the lead adult. No lesson planning or teaching is required. By church policy, two adults are needed each week. Currently we are unable to offer nursery care for children under the age of 3 as we are in need of additional adult volunteers to help with this area. If you are fully vaccinated and would be able to help once a month in either the SHINE program or childcare, please contact Gayl Galen.

Vacation Bible School

After a long wait and months of planning, WPC was able to once again host a Vacation Bible School program for children of our congregation and families in Webster. On July 26th, 27th and 28th the hallways and rooms at church were transformed into a railroad for *Rocky Railway* where the message was "Jesus' Power Pulls Us Through." Even though our registration numbers were low with 18 children attending, the excitement was clearly present each and every day through music, crafts and Bible lessons. As we said goodbye to the kids on the last day, they all asked if they could come back next year! That's the best "Seal of Approval" we could have asked for. A special Thank You to all of our wonderful volunteers. Our program would not have been possible without you!


