From Pastor Phil

"Think outside the box" is a common expression. It comes up in all kinds of situations when people are looking for a way forward. I want to challenge the good people of the Webster Presbyterian Church to "think outside the box" as you look forward into the future ministry of the church. In order to do so you must first admit to the "boxes" you are in and how those boxes have shaped all aspects of your lives.

Mission Updates

Special Giving Opportunity for December Tornadoes in Kentucky

From January 2nd until 23rd, we will be collecting voluntary contributions that will be sent to Presbyterian Disaster Assistance to help with the recovery from the devastating tornadoes in Kentucky and nearby states. PDA is already working in this area as a first responder. January 23rd - Adult Ed from Kenya!

Adult Ed on January 23rd will feature John Sankok virtually from Kenya. Our mission teams to Kenya have been blessed to be able to work with John, and our congregation has supported his projects for many years.

He will talk about his project to change the Maasai tribe's practice of having their 12 to 15 year old daughters marry much older men to get a payment from the men. John persuades some Maasai families to allow their daughters to get a high school education instead of "selling" them in marriage. We provide total financial support for two of these girls each year for this schooling.

John is also a "nurse-plus" with additional medical education in areas such as minor surgery, dental work and delivering babies. He was originally mentored by an American physician, Dr. Susie Snyder. He is now director of at least 10 medical clinics in the very sparsely populated Maasai Mara region of Kenya (where wild animals such as lions, cheetahs, giraffes and elephants roam)! These clinics are the only modern medical facilities in this large region of Kenya, and he will talk about them also. Please come to what will be a very interesting discussion!

Christmas Joy Offering

We are still accepting contributions for the Christmas Joy offering until January 2nd. Special envelopes are in the chair racks. This special Presbyterian denominational offering is used to provide emergency financial assistance to active and retired pastors and church workers, and to provide scholarships and other aid to Presbyterian-related colleges that primarily serve students of color.

Deacon's Doings

Annual Meeting Luncheon

The Deacons will be serving a light lunch during this year's Annual Meeting of the Congregation. For ordering purposes, we need to get a head count of how many people are interested. On behalf of the Deacons, **thank you** for your donations to the Angel Tree! Thanks to the generosity of our congregation, 110 gifts were donated to the Williamson Come-Unity Center this holiday season. We were thrilled to once again continue this long-standing Christmas mission during these uncertain times. The Come-Unity Center's Christmas event takes place every December. Families register ahead of time to come to the center and choose from the donated gifts - this year, 300 families were served. They were so grateful for our donations.

The Center has been serving Wayne County residents in need since 1949. More than 4,000 people a year are served with free boxes of food on a monthly basis. Over half the people served are children, senior citizens, or disabled. They also offer financial assistance with heat, rent, and prescription medicine. Free clothing is given to people in crisis. The "Common Cents" thrift shop provides about 1/3 of their budget. Donations of clothing and household goods are accepted.

"More than half a century ago, some very special and courageous people planted seeds of harmony and unity by befriending and meeting the needs of Wayne County's migrant farm workers. Although their cause was not a popular one, they persisted and grew, championing society's downtrodden and steadfastly refusing government assistance in order to maintain their own independence. Along the way, they began to serve all people in need in Wayne County and learned that there is more sameness than differences in diverse peoples. Soon they saw the wisdom in seeking good people of all races, religions, classes and ages to assist them in their cause of working toward the common good. Thus the Wayne County Rural Ministry/Come-Unity Center, Inc., was born and good people like you have been befriending and helping the rural poor of Wayne County ever since."

A Note from Session

They say as you are driving, look through the windshield first, and then through the rearview mirror. I'd like to start by looking through the rear view mirror of 2021 as I complete the first year of my fourth term on Session. We have much to be thankful for. Pastor Phil completed almost two years leading our worship service, the tech team greatly improved the online broadcast of services, the Shine program restarted, Youth Fellowship was active, Deacons and Trustees continued their programs of service to the church, new staff was welcomed, generous pledges and gifts came in, adult ed didn't miss a beat, Bible studies met regularly, a strong mission outreach program locally, nationally, and internationally continued, and the Healing and Reconciliation Steering Committee helped us through the trauma of 2020.

So, what's up as we look through the windshield for 2022? We are in the early stages of beginning a search for a new pastor to lead our fellowship. Session and representatives from deacons and trustees are interviewing for a consultant to help us develop a Mission Study for our congregation. We will all have an opportunity to contribute to this process in 2022. While our ongoing programs will continue, I hope that all our members will help us with this process of preparing to call a new pastor which we hope will be completed sometime in 2023.
