## A Note from Session

We continue to make good progress toward beginning the pastoral search process. In April, nine teams of observers drove around town and reported their findings to our consultant, Rev. Dr. Carson Mouser. Rev. Mouser has received a demographic report from Experian Marketing Services which he is reviewing with four WPC members. We will soon receive a summary of these reports from Rev. Mouser to help us identify community needs. These reports will be shared with the congregation.

In May, the congregation will be asked to complete a questionnaire to help us to identify the pastoral characteristics and competencies of the person who God is leading to us. Our goal is to complete this preparatory work so the congregation will be ready to elect a Pastoral Nominating Committee (PNC) in June. The All-Church Nominating Committee will begin seeking nominees for election to that committee very soon. If you are interested in becoming a member of the PNC, please contact myself or Kathy Barbehenn for more information.

#### **Spiritual Nurturing**

Our experiment with the spiritual practice of Contemplative Prayer in shared silence on Zoom on Holy Saturday (11:30-noon) was well received by those who attended. A few expressed the desire to try it again.

Another form of Contemplative Prayer is called *Lectio Divina*. It is "...a way of sitting with a passage from the Bible and letting the Bible speak into our lives." *Lectio Divina* means "sacred reading" and has been in existence throughout Christian history; it came into its own in the 6th century, becoming an essential part of monastic life and prayer. It may be done alone or in a group setting. There are four basic steps:

- 1. **Read** a Bible passage slowly 2 or 3 times, watching for a word or a phrase that jumps out at you.
- 2. *Meditate* or ponder the meaning of the word or phrase.
- 3. **Pray** however you are moved on the word or phrase.
- 4. **Contemplate**, listening and waiting for God to speak to you, perhaps through an image or a metaphor.

You could begin with May's Memory Verse of the Month: 2 Timothy 1:7.

Your Spiritual Nurture Committee is discussing resuming Prayer Under the Cross. We will need volunteers to help lead praying. We are also considering offering the opportunity to engage in the spiritual exercise of walking a Labyrinth. "Labyrinth walking is an ancient practice used by many... faiths for spiritual centering, contemplation and prayer... It has one path (unicursal). Once at the center, there is only one way back out."

\*The discussion of Lectio Divina comes from the book <u>Joy Together: Spiritual Practices for Your Congregation</u>, by Lynne Baab.

## **Mission Updates and Opportunities to Give**

#### One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS)

From March 27th until April 24th, we collected voluntary donations for OGHS. As of April 19th, the total amount collected was \$3865. Thank you!

#### Donations for Ukraine Relief

During March and April we also collected voluntary donations for relief for Ukrainians in Ukraine and for their refugees in surrounding countries. As of April 19th, your donations have totaled more than \$2700, and in addition, the Mission Committee has allocated an additional \$1000 from its Discretionary Mission Fund for this extremely worthy cause! #### Coffee Connections Adult Ed on May 8th



Guest speaker, Rev. Joy Bergfalk, Executive Director of the Coffee Connection will be here to tell us about the CC program and how it empowers women on their journey to sustainable recovery from addiction. Through counseling

and training, these women are able to find jobs in the CC shops that sell fair trade and organically grown coffee. There will be a display of the coffee item for sale in the Narthex.

## Summer Clothing for Cameron Community Ministries

During the month of May, we will again be collecting summer clothing for Cameron Community Ministries located in the city where a lot of needy people reside. Collection boxes will be available in the Narthex beginning May 1st. Here are their current specific needs:

Casual summer clothing for men, dressy and casual summer clothing for women and casual summer clothing for children.

Please do NOT donate winter clothing at this time as they don't have room to store it and do NOT



donate dress clothing for men as they already have plenty of that. If you don't have anything to donate from your closets, please consider going to a local thrift or discount store to purchase something. Thank you.

#### Summer Mission Projects

This year the Mission Committee was blessed to have six worthy projects to consider for Summer Mission. After some discussion, we selected the following two as being especially deserving:

*Jennifer House:* they provide housing and other services for women who have been incarcerated or abused or have been homeless. Jennifer House is part of Spiritus Christi's prison outreach project.

*Keeping Our Promise:* this organization provides comprehensive resettlement for refugees from US allies who have served our interests in conflicts and war zones. They are currently resettling mostly refugees from Afghanistan in the Greater Rochester area.

We won't begin collecting for Summer Mission until June, so look for more details in the June Pathway. Also, both of these organizations will send one or more representatives to talk to us about their ministries at the June 5th Adult Ed. We have set this year's goal to be \$8000 and will divide whatever is received equally between these two ministries.

## Youth Fellowship Service Project

Do you have a gently used purse or drawstring bag that you are no longer using? Youth Fellowship is asking you to fill it with hope. To honor the women in our lives, we are collecting gently used purses and drawstring bags filled with new personal care items to give to women in need at Jennifer House, Spiritus Christi Prison Outreach.

Recommended new items are: hand/body cream, hand sanitizer/wet wipes, lip balm/lip gloss, facial moisturizer/cleanser, pen, notebook/journal, hairbrush/comb, tissues, deodorant,



tooth brush/paste, floss, shampoo and conditioner, nail kit, soap, feminine hygiene products, first aid kit, socks, gloves, hat.

There will be a collection bin in the Narthex for the month of May.

This is the time at WPC when we honor or remember those who have made a difference in our lives as Christians. On May 1st and 8th, we

will be accepting donations in their names. Yellow Rose Sunday will be May 15th when we will dedicate the gifts during the service.

All donations will go to the WPC Endowment Fund. Like the annual pledge, an endowment gift is a way to financially support the mission and programs of the church. Unlike normal pledges, an endowment gift is perpetual – the church retains the principal value of the gift, and each year just uses the interest income. In a typical year, the fund can conservatively provide between \$5,000 and \$10,000.

For over 30 years, the endowment has grown, and WPC has reaped the benefits, using the proceeds for things such as choir robes, the grand piano, New Beginnings, and Mission projects.

You can donate by using the Yellow Rose envelopes at church, by mailing in a check and noting that it is for Yellow Rose, or clicking on the 'Give' button on the website and indicating that it is for Yellow Rose.



## Green Tip of the Month

Bottled water is not healthier or safer than tap water because it is not regulated as strictly.

Bottled water costs a lot more than tap water, requires 47 million gallons of oil per year to produce, and produces 1.5 million tons of plastic waste each year. Multinational bottled water corporations purchase groundwater and distribution rights to commoditize a basic human right: the access to safe and affordable water. Instead, use a stainless steel thermos. If you do not like your tap water's taste, use a water filter.
