## To My Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

During June and July this year, the 225th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church USA met in Louisville, Kentucky. If you are wondering what the General Assembly does, it is described on the denomination's website as follows:

"The General Assembly consists of commissioners elected by presbyteries. Half of the commissioners will be ruling elders, half will be teaching elders. Few will ever have been commissioners to the General Assembly before, but most will have served in one of the other governing bodies of our church: the session, which provides care and oversight of a local congregation; the presbytery, which provides care and oversight of a group of congregations; or the synod which provides care and oversight of several presbyteries. It reviews the work of synods, resolves controversies in the church, is responsible for matters of common concern for the whole church, and serves as a symbol of unity for the church."

Our local Presbytery sent five representatives. I've included a summary from the denomination's website of the actions of the recent General Assembly that can be found on pages 9 & 10. I ask that you prayerfully consider them. What are your first thoughts about these actions? How do your thoughts about these actions align with you individually and with the denomination collectively for building the Kingdom of God?

## **A Note from Session**

At a congregational meeting on June 12th, seven church members were elected to serve on our Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC). We thank Nancy Granger, Rachel Dolan, Gayl Galen, Matthew Clark, Heather Hewlett, Amy Vallone, and Eric Phillips for the service they will be providing to help identify the pastor who will be called to our church. The committee met several times over the summer at an organizational meeting with our Presbytery Committee on Ministry representative and with our Mission Study consultant. Their first task will be to prepare a Ministry Information Form (MIF) which will be used to match candidates seeking new positions with our church using the PCUSA leadership connection data base. Please offer your prayers of support and encouragement to the PNC as they begin their work.

During the summer months, Abbey Mayer, a communications major at SUNY Geneseo, served as a volunteer intern to improve our use of social media. Abbey created and posted weekly news and highlights for the church on Facebook and Twitter. Our Sunday morning service broadcasts on Facebook and You Tube have been receiving about 70 views weekly, either during worship time or later. So thanks to Abbey for helping us keep in tune with the virtual world.

# Let's Make Second Chances Work for WPC!

The Presbytery of Genesee Valley has informed Session that there are grant monies to support the work of congregations as they seek to respond faithfully and creatively to today's needs. Please read the following grant opportunities and share your grant ideas with any Elder or a note to the office. It would be wonderful if committees or groups would act quickly and write for a grant to support the work of WPC. Grant applications are easily completed and are due September 20th.

### There are two Second Chance Grants:

The **Congregational Vitality Grant** is focused on congregations trying to live into something that is very new to them. For example, last year WPC received a \$500 Grant that was used for new signage to welcome the community to our worship services and support for our streaming effort. What are your new dreams, new ways of sharing our message, and new initiatives to foster development, redevelopment, and renewal of our congregational life?



#### The Collaborative Ministry Grant

is intended to encourage intentional partnerships that serve the people of our local community in Christ-like ways. God works through community and relationship, especially in challenging times. Thus, Collaborative Ministry Grants aim to promote ministry connecting PGV congregations or neighborhoods with one or more community agencies, faith communities, or other local entities. What collaborations are in your heart to foster new community relationships?

# **Spiritual Nurturing**

Welcome back from your Spiritual Nurture Committee! How did it go this summer practicing the breath prayer that we described in the June

Pathway? We would like now to turn our focus to the spiritual discipline of thankfulness. Author Lynne M. Baab in her book, Joy Together: Spiritual Practices for Your Congregation, states that, "Prayers of thankfulness enable us to see what God has been doing and where God has been working...enable us to notice the specifics of God's work and the patterns of God's goodness in our lives and the lives of others. Prayers of thankfulness make us stop and look." When your Small Group meets next time, check in with each other and discover where God has answered prayers in ways hoped for or unexpected, and then thank Him in your prayers together. If you come forward during worship to light a candle, try making one of your prayers a prayer of thankfulness for what God has done in your life or someone else's. Wake up in the morning thanking God for a new day in which to rejoice and be glad. Be watchful throughout your day for signs of God moving in your life and give thanks. "God is present in the lives of all people in one way or another, and thankfulness prayers encourage us to notice."

*Let* the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, since as members of one body you were called to peace. And be thankful. *Let the message of* Christ dwell among you richly as you teach and admonish one another with all wisdom through psalms, hymns and songs from the Spirit, singing to God with gratitude in your hearts. And whatever you do, whether in word or deed, do it all *in the name of Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father* through him.

Colossians 3:15-17 (NIV)

On another note, an indoor labyrinth is on loan to us from Presbytery. It is 24'x24' and will be presented to you in an Adult Ed program on

October 23rd in the Social Room. A labyrinth is not a maze; there is a clear path in and out. "The earliest examples of labyrinths go back nearly 5000 years, but the use of labyrinths in Christian prayer emerged in the Middle Ages. Praying with a labyrinth is a form of walking meditation, a physical expression of the interior journey towards Christ that characterizes all Christian meditation." (McGrath Blog) More to come when the time gets closer! In the meantime, the labyrinth is available to walk if anyone wishes to try it. It is best if there are just two or three at a time to allow for space to walk at the same time at your own pace. Please contact one of us on the SNC and we will check the availability of the Social Room. We would lay it out for you before your scheduled time. If Presbytery has need for it before October 23rd, we would have to let it go until then.

## **Mission Updates and Opportunities to Give**

### Summer Mission Projects Update

As you know, this year the Mission Committee selected and Session approved two very deserving projects to share our Summer Mission voluntary donations!

**Jennifer House** provides housing, counseling, and other services for women who have been incarcerated or abused or have been homeless. Our donations will likely be used to buy a new large freezer for Jennifer House.

**Keeping Our Promise** provides comprehensive resettlement for refugees from countries of US allies who have served our interests in conflicts and war zones such as Afghanistan. Our donations will go toward buying a used car for an Afghan family, at a cost of at least \$4000.

Our goal was \$8000 and we are so blessed that as of this writing, total donations have been more than \$9600! Thank you so much for your generous contributions!

### **Clothing for Cameron Community Ministries**

During May we delivered 2 van loads (more than 30 bags) of gently new and used men's, women's, and children's summer clothing to Cameron Community Ministries in Rochester. As always, Cameron was very thankful for your donations!

### School Supplies Collection

The Mission Committee is very thankful for the overwhelming generosity of this congregation for the many school supplies collected for Williamson Come-Unity Center and Eastern Service Workers. A special thank you to the Deacons who helped collect items through their apple tree display.

It is such a blessing we are able to help equip so many children with the tools to start school.

### Kenya High School Students Fund

In 2021 we began the Kenya High School Students Fund to support a couple of deserving 8th grade graduates from Thogoto School near Nairobi, Kenya to continue their education in high school. In 2021, 3 students entered high school with our funding, and 2 more entered in 2022. Our goal is also to be able to sponsor 2 more in 2023 and 2 in 2024. These children are all very poor and without our support would not be able to attend high school in Kenya, as it is not free there.

From early September to early October, we would appreciate voluntary contributions that you would like to make to this ongoing fund. And we thank those of you who contributed in 2021 and to those of you who have made contributions already this year!

### Church Leadership

Key positions in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) were filled during the assembly. The Rev. Ruth Santana-Grace and Rev. Shavon Starling-Louis were elected co-moderators of the 225th General Assembly. The assembly confirmed Rev. Dr. Diane Moffett's re-election to a second term as president and executive director of Presbyterian Mission Agency. The assembly confirmed the re-election of the Rev. Dr. Tom Taylor as president of the Presbyterian and CEO Foundation, his fourth term. The assembly also confirmed the 2021 election of Rev. Dr. Asa Lee, president of Pittsburgh Theological Seminary.

#### Israel/Palestine

The General Assembly voted 266-116 to approve INT-02, a "Recognition that Israel's Laws, Policies and Constitute Apartheid Practices Against the Palestinian People." It declares that the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) "recognizes that the laws, policies, and practices of the government of Israel regarding the Palestinian fulfill people the international legal definition of apartheid."

### Fossil Fuel Divestment

General Assembly approved ENV-10 calling for divestment from five oil gas companies: and Chevron, ExxonMobil, Marathon Petroleum, Phillips 66 and Valero Energy. The assembly said the companies were not doing enough to slow global warming. Mission Responsibility Through Investment (MRTI) reports that this is the first time the PC(USA) has voted to divest from companies out of compliance with GA's environmental policies (which was established in 2018.)

#### **Unification and National** Structure

On a vote of 321-54, General Assembly approved FIN-10, which calls for the appointment of a commission to oversee and facilitate the unification of the Office of the General Assembly (OGA) and the Presbyterian Mission Agency (PMA) into a single agency. The assembly also approved MOV-02, which moves Mission Engagement and Support (MES) from the Mission Agency to the Administrative Services Group, which supports both OGA and PMA.

## **Unified Budget/Per Capita**

The assembly approved FIN-14, which includes unified budgets for the Office of the General Assembly, Presbyterian Mission Agency and the Administrative Services Group of the PC(USA), A Corporation. The budget for the three agencies and entities totals \$88.3 million in 2023 and \$89.5 million in 2024. The breakdown of the budget will be 16% for OGA, 79% for PMA, and 5% for ASG. The assembly voted to approve FIN-13 which assesses a per capita rate of \$9.85 per member in 2023 and \$9.80 per member in 2024. The current per capita rate is \$8.98 per member meaning an 87-cent (9.6%) increase next year while the 2024 rate will drop by five cents (0.5%) in 2024. The per capita budget for 2023 was approved at \$15.2 million and \$15.6 million for 2024.

### Immigration

By a vote of 340-25, the General Assembly approved IMM-06, allowing the church to declare itself a "Sanctuary and Accompaniment Church." The assembly's Immigration Committee says the decision sends a message that the church is committed to working for justice in U.S. immigration policy.

### **Gun Violence**

General Assembly approved a motion that the church renew its commitment to end gun violence by developing a 10-year campaign, the Decade to End Gun Violence (2022 -2032). The assembly also voted to direct Mission Responsibility Through Investment (MRTI) to engage with Walmart, Dick's Sporting Goods and Kroger, three publicly traded companies held by either the Board of Pensions or Presbyterian Foundation, that sell guns not classified as semi-automatic and assault-based weapons.

### Ukraine

The assembly also voted 374-1 to approve INT-19, a commissioners' resolution condemning the Russian military invasion of Ukraine and crimes against humanity, and calling for a cease-fire and the immediate resumption of internationally mediated negotiations.

### Race and Gender Justice

Commissioners and advisory delegates approved several items of business from the Race and Gender Justice Committee (RGJ), including RGJ-07: "A Resolution Addressing the Lack of Installed Pastoral Leadership in People of Color Congregations in the PC(USA) -From the Racial Equity Advocacy Committee" RGJ-08: "On and Offering an Apology to African Americans for the Sin of Slavery and Its Legacy." A two-hour plenary ended with votes overwhelmingly approving both items, and with white Presbyterians reading aloud "A Litany of Repentance" found in RGJ-08, which begins with the words: "As white Christians we repent of our complicity in the belief in white supremacy." The assembly also approved RGJ-12 calling for a new special committee to expose white supremacy within the denomination and make recommendations for improvement. In addition, the assembly approved RGJ-13, directing the Presbyterian Mission Agency and the Presbyterian Publishing Corporation to "create educational resources for congregations to identify and interrupt practices and perpetuate policies that the adultification of Black girls and criminalization of adolescent behavior." Commissioners and advisory delegates passed а resolution, RGJ-14, denouncing violence against Asian women and Pacific Islanders. The Church will form a committee to write a new PC (USA) confession.

### Summary of Actions cont.

### 226th General Assembly

The assembly voted to change the format of the 226th General Assembly, whereby committee meetings will be held online, with in person plenaries being conducted on site in Salt Lake City, Utah, in 2024. The assembly is expected to cost approximately \$2.8 million.

### Mid Councils

Commissioners and advisory delegates approved MC-10, which creates a task force to explore the theology and practice of ordination for ruling elders and recommend any changes to the 226th General Assembly (2024). The task force will include representatives who identify as BIPOC, immigrant congregations and New Worshiping Communities. Several amendments and motions were considered, but the overture was approved as amended by the committee.

#### Other

The General Assembly approved changes to the Standing Rules (STAN22) that alter requirements for those serving as Young Adult Advisory Delegates to the assembly. YAADs must be:

- An active member of a PC(USA) congregation or participant in a new worshipping community or immigrant fellowship that has a relationship with a presbytery.
- Between 18 and 23 years of age on the day the assembly convenes.

### The October Pathway deadline is SEPTEMBER 20th.
