
To My Sisters and Brothers at the Webster Presbyterian Church,




As we mentioned, the trustees manage the church workday program. And,

## **A Note From Session**

The Session of WPC is proceeding in our quest to learn more about LGBTQ+ so that we might truly show that we are working to fulfill our identity statement: "We are followers of Jesus Christ, living and sharing the love of God, through faith and action, welcoming all." To that end, we have invited Elder Ralph Carter, long-time member of Third Presbyterian Church in Rochester, to attend our April meeting. We are asking him to share his experience during the years that his church explored becoming a More Light Church and since that time. Also, we will ask him to increase our awareness of ways to demonstrate that WPC is a welcoming church to the LGBTQ+ folx (the inclusive alternative to folks). This year, and years ahead, we hope to offer Adult Ed programs that enhance the learning of the congregation as well as Session. A committee will be formed to follow up on our discussion with Ralph Carter. 

## **Spiritual Nurture**

Your Spiritual Nurture Committee has received a special request to repeat the presence of the Labyrinth for use during Easter week. As you may remember, it was made available in the Social Room on Ash Wednesday. To refresh your memory about the Labyrinth, here is a quote from the book, *Walking the Sacred Path: Rediscovering the Labyrinth as a Spiritual Practice*, by Lauren Artress, who in 1995, helped to bring the labyrinth back into public awareness:

"Walking the Labyrinth has reemerged today as a metaphor for the spiritual journey and as a powerful tool for transformation. This walking meditation is an archetype, a mystical ritual found in all religious traditions. It quiets the mind and opens the soul. Walking A Sacred Path explores the historical origins of this divine imprint and shares the discoveries of modern-day seekers. It shows us the potential of the Labyrinth to inspire change and renewal, and it serves as a guide to help us develop the higher level of human awareness we need to survive in the twenty-first century."

The Labyrinth will be laid in the Social Room from Maundy Thursday through Easter Sunday. It is okay for more that one person to walk it at the same time, in quietude. You can learn more by watching the YouTube video, *Spiritual Practice: Praying the Labyrinth*. Sue Palmer, Spiritual Practices Specialist at the Spirit in the Desert Retreat Center in Carefree, Arizona, hosts a 5:20 video that is quite enlightening.

May you encounter a sense of the divine as you avail yourself of this opportunity for spiritual renewal!

Another opportunity for spiritual renewal will be on Holy Saturday, April 8th, at 9:00 am on ZOOM. You are invited to join us in a 20-30 minute time of silent, contemplative prayer with others. Taking this brief time holds the potential to settle yourself, to make yourself available to God, to listen for him, to sense his guidance for you, to empower you to follow him and to serve him in your own unique way. Being in the presence of others is affirming and less lonely. Please consider joining us. The link will be sent in a church wide email a few days beforehand.

When Mary Grace was 5, the family came to America via the Panama Canal on a banana boat (yes, those are a real thing!) and settled in Wilkes-Barre, PA. Jack Thomas was born in Kingston, PA, but his great-great grandparents emigrated from Wales. (Sean Connery country!) Jack's family was raised in the Westmore Church of Christ.

They met while attending Christian Endeavor events (our local Webster Methodist church has hosted these in the past), courted, married and after a one day honeymoon in Atlantic City, settled down separately for their first year of married life. Mary Grace taught school in Williamsport, PA while Jack worked at Harter's Dairy in Dallas, PA.

Jack graduated from Rider University in 1953 with a degree in business. He worked for several years in a school for the deaf and finds himself unconsciously signing certain phrases while he's talking. Mary Grace, meanwhile, taught Spanish and Social Studies at Spry Middle School in Webster for most of 23 years.

Jack has always loved to sing and for 41 years was a member of SPEBSQSA (Society for the Preservation and Encouragement of Barbershop Quartet Singing in America!). Singing with The Chorus of the Genesee, he and Mary Grace traveled to many a competition throughout the Northeast. He organized and sang in multiple

quartets at WPC as well (not easy singing sacred music with a barbershop flare though!). Mary Grace taught basket-weaving in her basement for years – I am a proud student and a proud owner of several baskets made under her watchful eye. I loved every minute of her classes and use those baskets every day.

If you want to cook their favorite foods, just rustle up some macaroni and cheese, roast beef, potatoes and gravy. But if you REALLY want to make Jack, in particular, happy – cook up some Porcupine Meatballs!! (I don't think you'll find the recipe in your everyday cookbook though, so we may have to ask Jack to leak the family secret!).

As for travel, their favorite trips were overseas to see their missionary son Bill, daughter-in-law Colleen, and the grandkids in Ukraine, but they'll tell you the family's camping vacations were always the best time of the year. Their daughters, Gwen Hoffman and Gayl Galen, both settled in Webster and have followed the family tradition of service to others coupled with a strong and resolute faith.

Jack and Mary Grace will celebrate 69 years of marriage in July of this year – any words of wisdom to share?

*Mary Grace* – Keep a positive attitude.

*Jack* – Never go to bed mad – you don't want to start tomorrow with yesterday.
