From Pastor Phil

At the conclusion of our service on April 23rd, when Michael Boucher, LCSW, spoke about mental health, I sensed a measure of relief among many in the church family. In the wake of his remarks, I was asked a question that went something like, "What is the connection between our mental health and our spiritual health and doesn't good spiritual health lead to good mental health?" I would answer that by saying that both are aspects of our overall well-being.

As a Christian minister, my answer about spiritual health care is that it is what we do in pursuit of the peace of our Christ that passes all understanding. Our mental health is part of our peace. Peace that is aided when we concretely address and unpack issues or challenges that are negatively impacting our mental well-being, such as anxiety, depression, or stress.

As Christians, we are called to "take everything to the Lord in prayer," and without question prayer changes things. Yet, some of us carry burdens which can appropriately be labeled as trauma and the mental health professionals are best suited to help us understand it's impact and address it. The psycho-therapist, Resmaa Menakem, writes, "Trauma in a person, decontextualized over time, looks like personality. Trauma in a family, decontextualized over time, looks like family traits. Trauma in a people, decontextualized over time, looks like culture." Among the roles of the psycho-therapist is to help us unpack and put our anxieties in context.

Our guest speaker's remarks freed many to understand their overall well-being in a broader context which includes mental health care.

I can only call that a blessing.

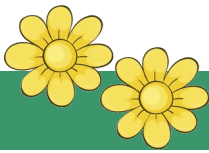

A Note From Session

Clerk's Report

Do you know what a connectional church is? According to the 2021 Presbyterian Church USA (PCUSA) statistical report, there were 8,813 congregations in our denomination at that time. Since then, some churches have been dissolved and some new congregations have been formed. Not surprisingly, as with many denominations, we have lost more churches than have been formed. We are connected to all the PCUSA churches by multi-state synods and regional presbyteries. Being a connectional church enables us to share resources including assistance such as finding a new pastor as we are doing now through the PCUSA leadership connection. We can participate in national and international mission programs as we just did through the One Great Hour of Sharing program. Our local Presbytery of Genesee Valley prepares a monthly newsletter informing local congregations about events occurring in our area. The link for the April newsletter is:

I will be attending the presbytery meeting on April 29th, at which time, the presbytery will vote on amendments to the PCUSA *Book of Order* that is part of our constitution along with the *Book of Confessions*. Next month, I'll summarize some of the decisions made at that meeting and how those decisions will connect us with other PCUSA churches.

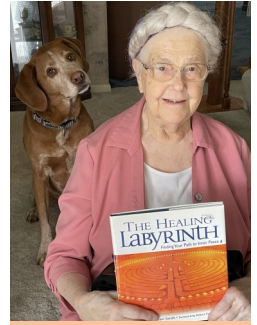

The Labyrinth

Perhaps you know that there is no longer a physical office for the Presbytery of the Genesee Valley (PGV). As a result, there is no space to store "stuff"! Our church has been the repository, under the stage, for the 24' x 24' cloth labyrinth that was laid in the Social Room during the Holy Days of Easter. You may have walked it. It is the property of the Presbytery and we borrowed it first for a Spiritual Nurture Adult Ed Program in 2022 as an example of a spiritual practice. Cheryl Battaglia, PGV Staff Operations Manager, asked if we would be willing to keep the labyrinth and loan it out to churches that may request it. We said, "Of course!" That led to us wanting to know about its origin and history.



The labyrinth was inspired by an airport discussion while traveling to an annual Christian Ed. conference! In 2003, Pat Hemmenway, Interim Church School Director at Bethany Presbyterian Church on Dewey Avenue in Greece, and Rev. Susan Hartley collaborated to sew and paint "our" labyrinth right at the church with the help of volunteers. In 2006, they actually painted a labyrinth on the parking lot of the church. The design that was used in both labyrinths is what was inlaid into the floor of the Chartres Cathedral in France during the 13th century, representing the spiritual journey we all take through life. Bethany Presbyterian opened the labyrinth to the public during specified hours. They used it as the centerpiece for their evening Vacation Bible School for all ages, including adults. It was taught about and used in the Church School. Pat has given us several books about labyrinths that we will add to our Library, as well as other literature, newspaper articles, and photos from the creation of their parking lot labyrinth. There has already been a request to borrow our labyrinth by the Parma Greece UCC!

The Emergency Action Plan committee is preparing an evacuation statement to be read once a month to state where the exits are, where to meet outside the church, and other items of importance in an emergency.

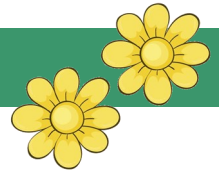
Letter signage is being purchased to identify the 15 outside doors to the church. We are working with the fire department regarding the size and reflectivity that is required.

The lettered doors will be identified on a drawing of the church. A copy of this will be given to the police and fire departments to help them locate, as closely as possible, where they are needed in case of an emergency.

Signs are also being purchased to identify where people are to meet outside the church in an emergency. One will be placed by the sign located in front of our church and the other will be located in the north parking lot in the unpaved area. The signs will read "Evacuation Meeting Place".

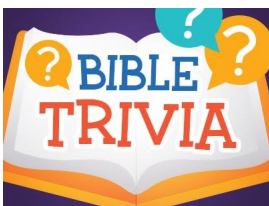

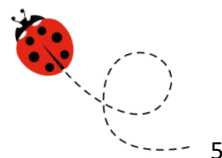

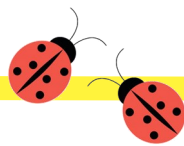

Please take the time to honor someone who means much to you and also help our church at the same time.

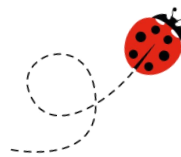


Heart and Hand

Getting to Know You



A peek into the lives of our Friends at Home.

Robert “Bob” Rollog

If you ever happen to find yourself in Norway, look up a town named Rollag. How many of us can say we have a town named after someone in our family? Dad was born in Canada and according to Bob “got tired of everyone mispronouncing Rollag,” so he changed the spelling. Mom was a native of Bellingham, Washington.

Bob will turn 94 in May this year – one of 5 kids, 4 boys and a sister who died at the age of 4 months. A child of the depression, Bob and his family did whatever it took to survive. His Dad worked the WPA projects of FDR, sold hot dogs and cars, and in June of 1940, took the family to Dutch Harbor, Alaska. He opened a bake shop in the SS Northwestern – a 103 foot steamship that ran aground and was being used by the military as temporary barracks! However, after December 7th, 1941, Bob’s family was evacuated back to Seattle. As a teenager after the war, Bob worked on tugboats pushing barges of lumber from Juneau to Seward, finished high school back in Seattle and in 1949, joined the Marines Aviation Group at Sand Point Air Station. He was stationed in Hawaii for ten months during the Korean War working as a mechanic. He also found a missionary church in Kailua and, upon returning to Seattle, accepted the Lord during a Billy Graham crusade.

Bob bounced back and forth between Washington and Alaska – worked for Boeing, a janitorial service, in a carpentry shop and as a longshoreman. He literally “bumped into” his second wife, Mary Anne, in Ketchikan. (There’s a rhyme in there “Mary Anne in Ketchikan!”) Mary Anne, a native of Bath, NY, had been teaching kindergarten in Webster. She and two friends went looking for adventure and applied for jobs in Ketchikan. Destiny took over, and when Bob’s final divorce paperwork came in the day before he married Mary Anne in 1966, the rest was history. Sadly, in 2004, after thirty-eight years of marriage, Mary Anne passed away.

They settled in Webster, and Bob continued to do whatever was necessary to support his family(s), having two children from his first marriage and two more with Mary Anne. He worked for a printing company, Comstock Foods, and rototilled gardens on the side. In 1978, he found stability and went to work for the Village of Webster, retiring in 1998.

Bob likes to read – more non-fiction than fiction. If you want to make him smile at the dinner table, just bring out either pot roast or steamed clams with plenty of drawn butter! (Yum!) If he could settle anywhere but Webster, he’d go to Port Angeles, Washington – in his opinion, the best of all worlds – moderate temperatures, skiing, fishing and camping year round, surrounded by mountains but close enough to the ocean, with easy access to both Seattle and Ketchikan. The way he describes it – I may move there myself!!

About 5 years ago, he and his daughter Beth took the best trip ever – Seattle to Ketchikan to Bellingham, Vancouver Island, Hurricane Ridge, Tacoma and, of course, Port Angeles. His son Mark flew in from Australia and met them in Ketchikan – now that’s family devotion!

Beth lives with her Dad, 3 cats and a dog, at the family home on Mohawk Street in the Village and works from home for an insurance company. Mark works for Apple in California. Steven and Jennifer, his children from his first marriage, live in Seattle and Missouri respectively. He also has two grandchildren and three great-grandchildren!

Bob’s memorable phrase: “It’s time for a strawberry milkshake!”
