Trustees' Corner

FALL WORK DAY

Please join the Trustees as we work through our project list, readying the church for the winter season. Coffee, cider, donuts, and bagels will be provided. All are welcome.



The throw carpets have been placed in the halls for fall and winter weather. We added jell strips to the underside of the carpets to keep them from slipping. Please let us know if there are any further issues.

The roof in the Social Room has a leak. We had patched it in hopes of resolving the issue. After our latest heavy rains, our efforts slowed the leak but did not eliminate it. We will be working with a contractor who will be able to determine the cause of the leak and patch it. This will be a minor repair and we will keep you posted on the progress of this project.

The Emergency Action Plan Committee has been busy at work. We have established emergency stations throughout the church which contain flashlights and high visibility vests. In the event of a fire, the designated fire leaders will be able to escort our members to safety. In addition, we have new maps of the church (thanks to the diligent work of Jennifer Wengender). We sent copies of the maps to both Webster Fire and Webster Police to help them plan should an emergency occur.



A Note from Session

It was with great joy that the church celebrated the installation of Pastor Nadia Mullin at a worship service on Saturday, September 30th. Representatives from the Presbytery of Genesee Valley presided at the service. WPC's former Associate Pastor, Walter Stuber, opened the service and told us a little about his current life since he left WPC. Reverend Gail Ricciuti offered the sermon. Our Pastoral Nominating Committee hosted a luncheon after the service as their final action to complete the process of leading Pastor Nadia to us. Thanks to all members of the PNC for their tireless efforts over the last year.

An announcement was made at the October 1st worship service that the Personnel Committee has recommended, and Session has approved, suspension of the Youth Program, ending the position of Youth Director for the time being. Unfortunately, over the last several years since COVID, we have seen a decline in participation in the program leading to the decision for this temporary suspension. It is our hope that as some of the younger children growing up in the church enter the youth years, that the program can be resumed. Also at the October meeting, Session discussed looking at alternative ways of offering opportunities for interested youth to join with other youth groups in faith and fellowship building activities. We thank Youth Director Wanda Nungesser for her years of service, offering excellent programs and activities for the youth. We value our youth, and it is our hope that a way to begin a program anew will come to light in the future. Please reach out to a member of Session if you have questions.

Lastly, I want to encourage every member or friend of the church, if not already involved, to choose one activity in addition to Sunday morning worship where you can lend your support. The Nominating Committee is seeking new members for the three church boards this month. If serving on a board does not interest you, all church committees are looking for new members. Also, there are Bible studies for both men and women, a book club, Heart and Hand, volunteer work projects to help maintain the church buildings with the Trustees, and other opportunities. Think about how you can help the WPC fellowship live the part of our faith statement, "through faith and action", by joining with others sometime in the next year. Your ONE (Our iNclusive Exploration) in Christ Session Subcommittee wishes to thank all of you who participated in our two October panel discussions of the book, *UNClobber: Rethinking the Misuse of the Bible on Homosexuality* by Colby Martin. The average attendance was thirty, indicating that exploration of LGBTQIA+ inclusion at WPC is of interest and importance. Our panelists, Anne Waasdorp, Ralph Carter, and Pastor Nadia lent their expertise and willingness to be vulnerable. Thanks to them, and to you, for your authentic and profound personal sharing and your respect for one another. This exploration, a labor of love, will take the time it needs to make sure that WPC is a safe place to be for all who come here, including LGBTQIA+ individuals. We would appreciate hearing feedback from you about our panel discussions. We would also like to know what types of programs would be helpful to you in learning more about LGBTQIA+ inclusion. You may approach any of our members with your thoughts and ideas: Sandi Blakey, Shirley Crane, LeeAnn Daigle, Barb Hach, Abbey Mayer, Alissa Mayer and Marj Shriver. The PC(USA), of which we are a part, has voted to permit ordination of LGBTQIA+ people and to permit same-sex marriages in church buildings by Presbyterian ministers. They have also committed to advocacy for equal rights in church and society for all sexual orientations and gender identities. To date, these policies are permissive and not mandatory.

New Beginnings

I think we are all pretty familiar with the New Beginnings Program at this point. It began a few years ago as a new and bold series of initiatives to expand our presence in the community and let people know that Webster Presbyterian is here, alive, and ready to help our neighbors. It was a great beginning and we learned a lot. Covid got in the way and we had to pull back. We had an Earthquake event here and New Beginnings had to pull back some more. In the process of recovery, we had the opportunity to take a long look at who we are, where we are in the community of God and the world, and looked forward to what might be a **NEW BEGINNING**.

And we started again. Our partnership with State Road has been wonderfully received by all. It has become a congregation-wide endeavor with book purchases and collections, readers, and music. We are reaching hundreds of children while we focus on promoting reading. As an additional benefit, we are reaching their parents.

We bring chimes to three different assistant living facilities and for an hour a week, those folks play hymns, and favorite songs. The side benefits? focus, rhythm, brain stimulation, socializing, and just plain fun. And they get to perform for their friends. At Cherry Ridge, the group plays at a Sunday service once a month. All the groups will play when the Glory Bells perform at Christmas. Outreach, love, sharing, and music therapy too.

By the way, Glory Bell concerts? that is outreach. Use of the building by Heritage Christian, Boy Scouts, Girls Scouts and the new Scouts program; those are outreach programs. Our professional kitchen has been used by outside groups for special events. The Christmas Parade? that's outreach. Heart and Hand? - oh my, those ladies are a treasure - sewing hats and scarves for kids at State Road and other groups, surgical caps and isolette covers for hospitals, pillowcases for our college freshmen, gifts for meals on wheels and so much more. This is outreach.

The parking lot is getting used for outside events. Food collections, special soup delivery from our local hospice, trunk or treat by the Girls Scouts are all outreach. All these are letting Webster know that we are here, we are open, and we welcome all.

And that is not all. New programs are developing, more people are involved and we are seeing new and old faces on Sundays. A community meal is in the works, along with movies nights and additional work with State Road. Concerts by outside groups that will be open to the public are being planned.

We are here, we are open, and we welcome all. And we can use your help. Think about what you can do, where you fit in, what tickles your fancy. Invite your friends and neighbors, offer suggestions; **we are here, we are open, and we welcome all.**

Getting to Know You

A peek into the lives of our Friends at Home.

Anna Jeanne Williams Watson Cameron descends from good English stock, mostly Welsh with a bit of American Indian added to the mix - like so many Americans - a real “melting pot” in her roots. She was born to Mildred and Chester Williams just a few short months before the stock market crash of 1929. The Roseland neighborhood in the town of Penfield was Jeanne’s home for the first 20 years of her life. She attended a one room schoolhouse on Plank Road, helped her family on their fruit and vegetable farm, sold flowers and crops at the Rochester Public Market, and graduated from Webster High School on Sanford Street in 1947. This building is now the much-modernized and renovated Spry Middle School. Jeanne furthered her education by attending dental hygiene school at the Eastman Dental Center in Rochester, graduating in 1948. She loved her profession and stayed with the same dental practice in Webster until her final ten years of working which she spent employed by New York State attending to special needs patients.

On May 14, 1949, Jeanne married Howard Merrill Watson at the original Webster Presbyterian Church on Main Street. They welcomed 5 children – Carol, Elaine, Merrill, Wanda and Thomas and, in time, 8 grandchildren and 9 great-grandchildren. They raised their family in a home they built on the family farm. Jeanne brought joy to her home through her music - playing both piano and organ. Christmas was a time for the family Christmas carol sing-along. Her favorite hobby however, was sewing (she would have loved being part of Heart & Hand!). She designed clothing, entered her creations in competitions at local and state fairs, made matching dresses for her daughters and granddaughters and, just so the guys wouldn’t feel left out, created deer hide vests for hunting season!! (Let me tell you, sewing hides together is no easy task!) Everyone learned to sew in Jeanne’s house and there was always a “project” happening in the sewing room. Dresses, suits, prom gowns, wedding dresses, bridesmaids’ gowns, fleece jackets, mittens and hats, and if that wasn’t enough, she moved on to quilting so she could make wedding quilts as the kids married!! Vacations were spent tent camping, fishing and water-skiing at Kring Point State Park in the Thousand Islands. Sadly, after 35 wonderful years together, Howard passed away in 1984.

Jeanne was blessed to find love a second time and married Robert Cameron in 1991 at the **new** Webster Presbyterian Church. The family now included Robert’s 5 children, 11 grandchildren and 16 great-grandchildren!! A total of 54 relatives – now that’s a family tree with a LOT of branches!!

Jeanne loved to travel and has camped (via tent, pop-up camper, or 5th-wheel trailer) her way through every state in the Union and all but Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island in Canada! She and Bob even tent camped for their honeymoon! After retirement, they wintered in Texas for 12 years pulling their 5th-wheel along to make the trip easy and enjoyable. Heartbreakingly, Jeanne became a widow for the second time in 2019.

Never one to shy away from new experiences, Jeanne rode a chairlift up a mountain at Holiday Valley in Ellicottville to attend her granddaughter, Sara Nungesser’s wedding at the age of 93!

When asked what she wanted for her 94th birthday dinner, Jeanne said Zweigle’s white hots and pecan pie and, you know what, that’s exactly what her family gave her!

Even though Jeanne made it her business to visit the rest of the United States, in her words “There’s no place like home!” (although she admits she would still like to check off those two Canadian provinces!) She knows her legacy includes the wonderful family she helped create and hopes she is remembered for always trying to make people happy. Two of her children are part of our WPC family, Elaine Wilbert and Wanda Nungesser. Currently, the sisters share caring for Jeanne who lives with Elaine and John Wilbert.
