## Dear WPC family,

Martin Luther, father of the Protestant Reformation, once wrote: “Our Lord has written the promise of resurrection, not in books alone, but in every leaf in springtime.” As springtime approaches (and for some of us, not soon enough!) we see how the world demonstrates resurrection. We watch as leafless trees begin to bud. We see crocuses pop up through the cold soil. We feel that ineffable change in the air as winter recedes and spring approaches. Easter’s arrival is coupled with the arrival of spring. And the whole created order shows forth God’s creative and renewing beauty.

The season of Lent is upon us, with a month standing between us and the joyful shouts of Easter. What do we do in the meantime? In these waning months of winter, as Lent marches onward, what do we do? It is the perfect time to practice some new spiritual disciplines, to give something new a try that might connect you with the Holy One. My spiritual director has been encouraging me in my own pursuit of spiritual practices that might be life bringing and spiritually fulfilling. So if you ever find me sitting in the Sanctuary in silence, or with my head bowed over a closed computer, know that I am also in pursuit of new (and sometimes old) spiritual practices that rejuvenate and connect me to God.

Later this month, we will encounter Holy Week. And there are many opportunities to observe that special week. The Labyrinth will be set up that week. Our weekly prayer time will feature a 30 minute time of silence on the Saturday before Easter. There will also be services on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. There are many options available to you for ways in which you can observe Holy Week as we walk with Christ to the cross, through death, and to resurrection on Easter morning.

As the created world slowly begins to change and be renewed around us, may we remember the one who makes all things new, even us.

## Trustees’ Corner

The Trustees elected to change internet and phone providers to Frontier. We installed new fiber optic lines the week of February 12<sup>th</sup>. This change allows us to have faster, more reliable internet access, more bandwidth for streaming, and all at a lower cost. Overall, it was a winning proposition for the church.

We repaired the circulating pump for the radiator office heating system.

Our old friend, the roof leak, returned to the Social Room. We are monitoring it closely but expect that we may need to make more significant repairs in the spring/early summer. We will keep the congregation posted on our decisions regarding this roof repair.

Speaking of the roof, during the mild weather of February, we were able to clean the flat roof surfaces and clear the gutters of debris. This process reduces the potential for ice formation and damming.

Please remember that winter is still not over!! Watch your step in the parking lot as we mentioned last month. The new surface is more slippery than the old, bumpy lot. Please use caution and remember the wise words of Danny Wegman: “Walk like a penguin.”

Lastly, we want to express our appreciation for Herman Rolle. He is responsible for keeping our church neat and clean. We have a very large building which is not easy to keep clean. He manages to keep it sparkling week after week. If you see him in the hall, please thank him for his hard work.



## ONE in Christ

Our ONE (Our iNclusive Exploration) in Christ Committee was awarded a \$1000 grant from the Presbytery of Genesee Valley to explore the possibility of becoming a More Light Presbyterian Church. Their mission is to empower and equip congregations to live into their welcome for LGBTQIA+ people. Our goal was to make sure that we are living into our Identity Statement: “We are followers of Jesus Christ, living and sharing the love of God through faith and action, **welcoming all.**” Throughout the year, we have offered Adult Ed programs to get a sense of where you, our congregation, stand in regard to this. We learned that some of you did not like the idea of our church being labeled “More Light.” Others, especially newcomers, believe we already are open, affirming, and inclusive, while many of our members want to be known in that way.

For ONE in Christ, welcoming all, means *all*. We are not just talking about the LGBTQIA+ community, but also people of color, people with disabilities, addictions, mental health needs, illnesses.... We have designed a banner depicting the colors of the numerous groups that represent the “*all*” that we welcome. When the “way be clear,” we will share it with you. Lindsay Gray, the Editorial Director of the Upper Room, wrote recently, “God calls us to love our neighbors and ourselves just as we are...When...we choose to see *all* people as God’s children, we are building the kingdom of God.”

The Grants Working Group of the Presbytery is asking us to submit a follow-up report a year later. If you have a story about your experience with what we have presented to you, where you might have seen God in it, and wish to share it with us and the Presbytery, please let us know. Thank you!

## Mission Update

### One Great Hour of Sharing Offering

The annual One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) special offering is sponsored by our denomination (PCUSA) as well as by many other church denominations during Lent. This offering is distributed by PCUSA in the USA and to many other countries to benefit needy folks approximately equally in 3 different ways:



1. Disaster assistance for those impacted greatly by major disasters such as earthquakes, hurricanes, floods, tornadoes and fires. One prime example in 2023 was for victims of the fires in Maui. These funds are administered by Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA).
2. Presbyterian Hunger Program – provides emergency food and supplies to various under-served food areas and groups around the world.
3. Self Development of People – provides needy communities and groups with self-help resources to cast off the bonds of poverty and oppression by providing seeds and seedlings for farming, farm animals, tools and other items to help them become more self-sufficient and independent.

We will be collecting for this important, special offering from March 3<sup>rd</sup> until March 31<sup>st</sup> (Easter Sunday) and OGHS envelopes will be in the chair racks in the Sanctuary during this time. Please pray about giving a generous contribution to OGHS. Thank you!



### Visit to Bellas Bumbas

In January, several of our Mission Committee members visited the assembly location for Bellas Bumbas, which is located just a mile or so from our church!

Bellas makes mobility devices for young children who would otherwise be very mobility challenged. We have supported them in our church budget

for a number of years. They have now built more than 2600 such devices and shipped them to 65 different countries, which is very inspiring! They are non-profit and only charge customers for shipping.



### Blanket Sunday Special Offering

Our annual special offering to support Church World Service's Blanket Sunday officially ended on February 11<sup>th</sup>. We collected a total of \$1321 this year which will provide more than 130 warm blankets to needy folks worldwide! Thank you for your generous contributions!

# Getting to Know You

## *A peek into the lives of our Friends at Home*

Faith has been her foundation for all of her 99 years. Ruth Jodar Huboi was born in 1924 to a German mother and a father from the region of Europe known as Alsace-Lorraine. Interestingly, her maiden name, Jodar, is Spanish in origin! Her parents grew up in Wisconsin where, oddly enough, her grandfather was a cheese broker! When her father got a job in Moline, Illinois, the family moved and Ruth and her two siblings grew up near the Mississippi River. According to Ruth, her mom and dad spoke German in the house “to keep the kids from knowing what was going on!” (pretty smart if you ask me!) Her older brother joined the Air Force during WW II and trained as both a meteorologist and a navigator. Sadly, his aircraft crashed in England returning from a mission and he was killed. Her younger sister suffered from severe rheumatoid arthritis and also passed away.

Ruth received her degree in physics from the University of Wisconsin and upon graduation was recruited by Kodak. Unbeknownst to her, a year later her future husband, Robert, having earned his degree in Chemical Engineering (courtesy of the Air Force), would also graduate from the University of Wisconsin and be recruited by Kodak. The recruiters mentioned that another Wisconsin alum had recently joined the company and it wasn't very long before Ruth and Bob connected through the Outing Club sponsored by the YWCA/YMCA. Soon after that there was a wedding back in Wisconsin. Bob and Ruth drove off in Bob's brother's car (they didn't have one yet as cars were in very short supply after the war) to enjoy their honeymoon at a family cottage on nearby Crystal Lake.

The Hubois had four children – Firstborn is Teresa who lives in Hawaii and has two children living in the States. Teresa vowed she was not going to Carnegie Mellon to find a husband; she was going to study art! However, she met Jim the first week she was there and that was that! Sadly, after many great years together, Jim passed away just last year. Next came Peter who lives with his wife Patty in California with Patty's two daughters. Sally came third and has daughters Becky and Hilary. Becky and her husband Eric have given Ruth 6 great-grandchildren!! Hilary, her husband Fred and their two children live in Texas. Last came Julie – a bit of a surprise according to Ruth since she was 44, but a grand addition nevertheless. Julie and her husband, Andrew, have two children and live in Arlington, Virginia. Julie works for the government on “secret stuff”!

In addition to family visits and keeping up with the grand and great-grandchildren, Ruth and Bob loved camping. They traveled out West three different times and their equipment improved each time. Trip one was a car and a pup tent! Trip two was a car and tent trailer. For trip three, they graduated to a motorhome which Ruth remembers as pure luxury!! Her absolute favorite pastime, however, is downhill skiing! Reluctantly, she had to give it up when she turned 93!!!

Ruth has lived with and overcome a particularly challenging health condition due to the removal of two of the five lobes in her lungs. She basically had to learn how to breathe a different way but it never kept her from skiing, traveling or, amazingly enough, singing!! Her presence in the WPC choir was steadfast and I know my husband always enjoyed getting a rise out of her.
